*Father of positive thinking: Single-minded goal focus gets results*



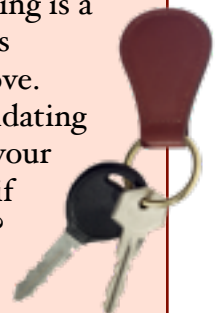

### WORDLIFTING: DOUBLE QUOTES V. SINGLE QUOTES -- WHICH WOULD WIN?

A series of children's books pits ferocious creatures and prehistoric animals against one another, theoretically. Let's try it for these two often-confused symbols:

Double quotes are strong! Consider double quotes the default form, used when quoting a speaker or highlighting a word that is then explained. They can be used



for article or book titles, especially in newspapers.

Single quotes are most often for quotations

within quotations: The teacher said, "When I told my student he should usually use double quotes, he exclaimed, 'I never knew that!' and corrected the mistake."

Between double quotes and single quotes, double quotes almost always win.
